OPEN HOUSE ANNOUNCEMENT

The Mayor and City Council are happy to host a Middle Rogue Metropolitan Planning Organization (MRMPO) Open House on January 28, 2015, from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. in the City Council Chambers. The purpose of the open house is to provide an opportunity to review and comment on the first draft of the Middle Rogue Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). This plan affects the area within the MRMPO boundary, including Grants Pass, Rogue River, and Gold Hill, and is expected to be adopted in March 2016. All Rogue River area residents are encouraged to attend.

Regional transportation systems have significant and long-term impacts on economic well-being and quality of life. Not only does the transportation system provide for the mobility of people and goods, it also influences patterns of growth and economic activity through accessibility to land. Furthermore, the performance of the transportation system affects public policy concerns such as air quality, environmental resource consumption, social equity, economic development, safety and security.

The RTP is a multi-modal transportation plan designed to meet the anticipated 25-year transportation needs within the Middle Rogue Metropolitan Planning Organization (MRMPO) planning area boundary. It will include a list of short-, mid-, and long-term transportation projects to be completed by 2040 as funding becomes available. Projects must be on the list to qualify for federal transportation funding.

PROTECTING YOUR HOME AGAINST FROZEN & BURST PIPES

- Identify the main water shut-off to your home or business and try it before you have to use it. There should be a valve behind the water meter at the street. Call City Hall if you need assistance in locating your shutoff valve. We can be reached at 541-582-4401.
- Turn off outdoor faucets and disconnect hoses.
- Turn off and drain irrigation sprinklers and supply lines.
- Insulate pipes in your breezeway, crawl spaces and attic. These exposed pipes are the most susceptible to freezing.
- If your system is vulnerable, turn on faucets (both hot and cold) until they trickle slowly if you have any concern about pipes freezing, especially on very cold nights.
- Owners are responsible for all repairs past the water meter. Have your plumber's emergency phone number readily available.
- If you have a leak, notify the City immediately. If we can verify that the leak was underground between the meter and the building the City may allow a water adjustment of fifty (50%) of the estimated excess consumption.

Winter Driving Tips: Make sure you have a tune-up, a full tank of gas, and fresh anti-freeze.

You should carry the following items in your trunk:

- Shovel, ice scraper and snow brush
- Jumper cables
- Tow and tire chains
- Bag of salt or cat litter
- Working flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Wooden stick matches in a waterproof container
- Supplies to keep you warm such as heavy woolen mittens, socks, a cap and blankets.
- Foods like canned nuts, dried fruits, and hard candy.



If You Become Stranded...

- Do not leave your car unless you know exactly where you are, how far it is to possible help, and are certain you will improve your situation.
- If you are sure the car's exhaust pipe is not blocked, run the engine and heater for about 10 minutes every hour or so depending upon the amount of gas in the tank. Keep at least one window open slightly for fresh air.

HELP US KEEP THE LIGHTS ON

The City pays Pacific Power to maintain 170 street lights in town. We do our best to keep the lights on, but sometimes we need your help to let Pacific Power know if streetlights are out in your neighborhood. Nearest address – e.g.; 123 Main St.

Nearest cross street – e.g.; First Ave.
