Update MEMORIAL DAY

Mayor Pam VanArsdale opened the April meeting with a Moment of Silence then led the Council and audience in the Pledge of Allegiance. After the Council Committee reports were heard the City Council took action on the following agenda items:

- 1 Approved a Resolution adopting rules of procedure for all City Commissions, Committees, Council Liaisons, and Official City Representatives for the City of Rogue River, Oregon
- 2 Approved a request from Southern Oregon Sanitation for a general rate increase of 8.5% to the customers of Rogue River, Oregon
- 3 Approved a request from the Rogue River Kiwanis and the Rooster Crow committee to be a sponsor for the 70th Annual National Rooster Crowing Contest and to hang the Rooster Crow banner across Depot Street from May 15 to June 27, 2023

### 8.05.300 Noxious Vegetation and Debris - WEEDS

No owner or person in control or possession of property may permit weeds or other noxious vegetation to grow upon his property. It is the duty of an owner or person in control or possession of property to cut down or to destroy weeds or other noxious vegetation from becoming unsightly or from becoming a fire hazard or from maturing or going to seed.

A. The term "noxious vegetation" does not include vegetation that constitutes an agricultural crop unless that vegetation is a health hazard or a fire or traffic hazard within the meaning of subsection (B) of this section.

- B. The term "noxious vegetation" includes:
- 1. Weeds more than 10- inches high.
- 2. Grass more than 10-inches high.

PERMIT COST: \$2.00

Each permit allows you to hold a 3-consecutive day garage/yard sale and allows you up to 4-sales per year. Signs must be posted on private property with permission from the property owner. It is illegal to post ANY sign on a utility pole, stop sign, or sidewalk by anyone other than the City or a Utility Company. Signs posted that are not in compliance will be removed by the City. Violators of the Code can be cited into Court.

Memorial Day was originally called Decoration Day and was initiated to honor the soldiers for the Union and Confederate armies who died during the American Civil War.

Celebrations honoring Civil War heroes started the year after the war ended. The establishment of a public holiday was meant to unify the celebration as a national day of remembrance instead of a holiday celebrated separately by the Union and Confederate states. By the late 19th century, the holiday became known as Memorial Day and was expanded to include the deceased veterans of all the wars fought by American forces. In 1971, Memorial Day became a federal holiday.

Saturday morning starts with the Parade at 10 a.m. followed with the Cal-Ore Hydroplane Boat Racers qualifications, at 2 p.m. is the Human Crow which is judged by the audience and then at 2:30 p.m. the Rooster Crowing Contest will

begin and the day will end with live entertainment by the Old Time Fiddlers. Sunday morning we will be holding Church in the Park officiated by Pastor Coale from the Cowboy Church, the Cal-Ore Hydroplane Boat Racers will be holding their official races and the Rooster Crow Car Show where up to 100 pre-1975 vintage cars and pickups will be displayed along Pine Street in downtown Rogue River from 9am to 2pm.
